#### Vacancy for a Parish Councillor

A vacancy has arisen for a Parish Councillor and the notices of this have recently been displayed on the Parish notice boards inviting requests (to Suffolk Coastal District Council) to call an election to fill this vacancy; ten electors are needed to sign any request. Anybody interested may contact the Clerk who can provide further details or speak to any councillor. If no election is called then the vacancy will be filled by cooption.

#### Parking on Verges

There have been complaints about vehicles parking on the grass verges in a number of roads throughout the Parish. This damages the verge and ruins the grass leaving the area looking very unsightly in what is generally a very neat and tidy area. The parked vehicle may also be blocking visibility for other road users. Please park in your own drive or parking areas and not on the verge.

This year, 2002, will see the golden jubilee of the Queen's accession to the throne and the Parish Council will be pleased to

#### Litter and Dog Bins

There are many bins around the parish but we would like to know of any areas where there is a litter or dog fouling problem so that new bins could be considered or existing ones replaced. Martlesham is generally clean and tidy and we would ask everyone to help keep it so by using the bins for everybody's benefit.

## Parish Council Budget for 2002/2003

The Parish Council has been considering and preparing its budget for next year and it is faced with a large increase with a corresponding large rise in its precept that it receives via the council tax. The expenditure in the current year has had to be much more than expected when the budget was prepared last year particularly with land maintenance, where the lowest prices for the new contract were higher than expected and the contractor had to be replaced recently due to his very poor performance, staff changes when the assistant to the clerk resigned and a new Assistant Clerk appointed and an increase of the council's workload; the pathway across the Common has also been properly surfaced. It is expected that the council's reserves will have reduced by about £30.000 to about £74.000 by the end of March; this sum includes £26,500 for major grants that have not yet been taken up. Next year's budget is likely to be about £62,000 and it is possible that a precept of about £55,000 may approved. Although large in percentage terms it equates to an increase from about £17 to about £26 per year for a band D property. For this you have a fully accountable parish council that undertakes a lot of work to help keep Martlesham well maintained with many facilities and acts on the parish's behalf in an increasing number of issues (that may affect the parish both directly and

indirectly) that are raised through the planning process, from both central and local government and by residents. The Parish Council will have to decide its budget and precept for 2002/2003 at its meeting on 2nd January.

#### MARTLESHAM LADIES CLUB

32 members attended our meeting on November 22nd.2001 when our chairman introduced us to Mr. Bushby, an official in the Suffolk Agricultural Society, who gave us a talk on the Suffolk Show. He gave us an insight into the background and organisation that is involved in staging the show each year, from it's inception to the present day, with details of the acreage and plans involved he showed us some excellent coloured slides of the more interesting aspects of this event, regaling us with many jokes and anecdotes. He also told us about the many visits that Royalty had made to the show over the years. The year 2001 was, of course, blighted by restrictions because of the foot and mouth outbreak. but the show will be restored to it's full glory in 2002. The Organisers are looking into public requests for a 3 day event and perhaps include a Saturday or Sunday, but no decision has yet been made. Vera Pawsey thanked Mr. Bushby for a most interesting and informative talk.

At our meeting on December 6th. Mr. David Adams gave us a talk on the 'The Amazing Honey Bee' David told us that in 1853-58 bees were kept in straw skips, then a Mr. Langstaft invented the removable frame hive which has not changed to any degree since. Hives are closed for the winter and proofed against mice etc. There is one Queen Bee to

every hive. The capacity of the hive is 5000 in the winter and 50,000 in summer. On, or about, the 1st. of January the Queen starts to lay eggs, gradually increasing production to about 2000 eggs each day by the summer. The hive contains only a few drones to mate with the Queen and they are killed off if food becomes low. Worker bees, who feed the Queens with Royal Jelly, are immature infertile females and have a barbed sting, drones buzz but have no sting, while the Queen uses her sting to fight. Bees will fight to the death to defend the hive. They are very dangerous creatures and the human body can only stand so many stings, we were shown the protection clothes used by bee keepers. The bees are smoked when the honey frames are removed Although bees will travel up to 2 miles for nectar they prefer a source nearer to the hive. Worker bees only live about 6 weeks as they work so hard, flying at up to speeds of 12 miles per hour. The flavour of the final product cannot be guaranteed, and we were shown examples of good and bad honey. Many members bought jars of excellent quality honey that Mr. Adams had bought with him. Beryl Dyer gave a vote of thanks for a most excellent talk. We had our Christmas Party on December 20th. then fortnightly meetings will resume again on January 10th. 2002.
