MARTLESHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Budget and Precept for 2003/2004

The Parish Council has agreed a budget of £73,010 for next year and a precept (the money that it receives via the council tax) of £60,000. This precept is an in-

crease of £5000 on the current year's precept (£55,000) and although large in percentage terms it equates to an increase of about £2.30 per year for a band D property. For this you have a fully accountable parish council that undertakes a lot of work to help keep Martlesham well maintained with many facilities and acts on the parish's behalf in an increasing number of issues (that may affect the parish both directly and indirectly) that are raised through the planning process, from both central and local government and by residents.

This budget includes £2750 for grants including a grant to help keep Kesgrave Youth Club (to which many Martlesham youngsters belong) open on an extra evening each week. Much of these grants will come from the income of £2300 which the Parish Council anticipates it will receive from bank interest and recycling credits.

Working Parties

There are often a number of tasks needing to be undertaken that can be safely carried out by volunteers. It has been decided to have a monthly working party on the last Saturday each month when parish councillors and any other volunteers will be carrying out these tasks; volunteers are most welcome and if you are interested please contact the Clerk for further details.

Forthcoming Elections

On 1st May there will be elections for both the District and the Parish Councils in which both of these entire councils will be elected. There will be different arrangements regarding the new council wards and the Parish Council is hoping to provide full details of these in the Martlesham Monthly nearer the time. If anybody is interested in becoming a parish councillor please contact the Clerk, who can explain what is

involved in the first instance, or speak to any parish councillor.

Litter and Dog Fouling

Martlesham is a clean and tidy place and to help keep it that way the Parish Council will soon be installing some new litter and dog dirt bins. Please use these and the many existing bins around the parish to help Martlesham continue to be clean and tidy.

County Councillors

At the moment Martlesham has one County Councillor, John Kelso, shared with Kesgrave. The Boundary Committee for England of the Electoral Commission is now reviewing the County Council's electoral arrangements and is currently seeking views, comments and suggestions; the Parish Council will be considering this at its February meeting and a main concern is that having only one councillor representing both Martlesham and Kesgrave is insufficient and this needs to be improved.

MARTLESHAM HEATH W.I.

We began our new W.I. year with a meeting of 30 members plus several visitors. Our new president Kay Hall introduced the new Treasurer Ann Whelan and new Secretary Judy Smith. Kay thanked all the members for their support in making 2002 a most successful year and asked for continued support for 2003.

After a short business meeting, Kay introduced the evening's speaker Mrs Pippa Moss who was to talk on 'The Amish Quilts'.

Mrs Moss first gave a short

description of the Amish community and their lifestyle.

The Amish people are a self-supporting group who still farm and live their lives as in the 1890's and before. They have no machinery, using horses and wagons or bicycles for transport. They have no tractors but use old-fashioned ploughs in the fields. They live in a closed community, only venturing into the towns to trade their farm produce or craftwork. The children are educated in their own schools until they are 12 years old, then are expected to work the farms and homes. This practice is proving a problem with education authorities as most children attend full-time school until they are 16 years old. The Amish people still dress in old-fashioned plain serviceable clothing. They have no frills and the colours they wear are usually dark and muted. Bright colours and flowery patterns are forbidden.

So we wondered what the quilts would be like. The colours again were all fairly muted and plain with no patterned material at all. The designs were all on straight lines, for example squares, triangles and diamond shapes. But we were amazed at the beautiful finished designs and patterns on the quilt, so cleverly blended by shapes and colours. Then the hand quilting within the squares and so forth was a sight to behold. We were all thrilled with Mrs Moss's display of finished quilts.

MARTLESHAM & DISTRICT FLOWER CLUB

We welcomed Mrs Penny Stone to our meeting. Her theme was "Thanks for the Memory". Her arrangements were reminders of past holidays in places as far afield as Yorkshire and Singapore. The first piece, arranged in a rectangular iron frame using yellow irises, roses and lilies accompanied with ivy, acuba and twigs of bottlebrush reminded her of a panel of Tiffany glass seen in the Metropolitan Museum in New York. A pot in blue and white held yellow orchids, twisted willow, fern and fatshedera reminding her of holidays in Singapore. Being born in Wales she remembered the Welsh valleys and the coal mines, now no longer working. The next arrangement represented the pithead wheels using cones, mahonia leaves and cormus,

set off with green chrysanthemums, angelique tulips and angel hair to give the impression of coal dust. Singapore red orchids gave a touch of colour.

Stately homes and gardens in Yorkshire were depicted using a classic urn. Pennyused carnations, yellow irises and purple hyacinths accompanied by bronze formium, Hebe and variegated Viburnum.

From her own garden she chose a basket filled with a selection of evergreen shrubs including Lonicera, Sarcocilus, rosemary, piltosporum, garyya eliptica and Viburnum. The flowers were tulips, hyacinths and daffodils.

The last arrangement was a pedestal to represent Pompeii. Aspidistra leaves sprayed gold set off this arrangement of liatris, delphiniums, yellow lilies together with leather leaf fern, Elaeagnus and cotoneaster.

The competition "An Arrangement with a Child's Toy" was won by Margaret Forbes and the novice class by Sheila Swannage. Our next meeting will be on 19th February when Mrs Jill Clark will be our demonstrator, her subject "Dutch Design". There will be a workshop session too.

Happy New Year to all residents – I hope this will be a year of lots of progress on our 3 main projects:

- Sports Hall project with Kesgrave SPARK.
- Sports & Social centre at Kronjies Piece next to the Recreation Ground.
- Support for the Fusion skating club and their bid for a new Skate Park.

Multi Purpose Sports Hall Update

Rumours that the Sports Centre Project is dead are false. £800,000 has been raised. How's that for a start?

In fact, with Kesgrave and, subject to further discussions with Woodbridge, Kesgrave and Rushmere as well, the Sandlings Sports Centre is planned on about 2.5 acres of land near the Farmhouse Pub roundabout, of Hartree Way, Kesgrave. This first class site has been generously donated by the landowners subject to agreement that the area set aside for employment on which it stands is reduced by an equivalent amount of land

The building will consist of

two halls linked together by a central reception area with support facilities including changing rooms, fitness suite, meeting rooms and bar. On one side will be an international six-rink bowls hall. On the other side will be a multipurpose sports hall. Research into the need for a quality bowls hall has demonstrated a strong need with present waiting time to join existing clubs of up to two years.

To investigate the need for a multipurpose sports hall, meetings have been held with local and county representatives of badminton, basketball, volleyball, table tennis, netball, gymnastics, archery, fencing and short tennis.

All were enthusiastic about the proposed multipurpose hall and anticipated a ready flow of additional people being attracted to their sport.

In some cases it would allow much needed expansion, in some the setting up of new clubs, and in some it would allow participation by disabled players.

National lottery funding will be essential and at a meeting with the regional representative of Sport England, which is the distributor of lottery funds to sport, it became clear the lottery financial support for building a bowls hall is a strong possibility but that support for building a multipurpose sports hall would depend on proof that there is a shortage in the area. That is what our meetings with the various sports representatives have been about and our belief that there is a need is being borne out more and more with each succeeding meeting.

So far, against an estimated total cost, including land, of £3,700,000, we have a finance package worth well over £800,000. The second Stop Shop next to Tesco (Kesgrave) is a major contributor. The aim, along with our partners, is not just to build the Sandlings Sports Centre but to make it a centre of sporting excel-

lence with a wide range of sporting activities.

MARTLESHAM HEATH AVIATION SOCIETY

Our first monthly meeting of the New Year was held on Friday 3rd January in the Community Hall as usual. Our speaker was Adrian Bleese from the Suffolk Police Helicopter Unit.

This talk had been postponed from November and we were all looking forward to it. Adrian explained that the involvement by the Police in surveillance by air was nothing new. The 1921 Derby Day saw the airship R33 overhead to monitor the crowds. 1936 saw the first police air unit formed and fixed wing aircraft were often used by various police forces in the post WW2 period. 1953 saw the first trials of the use of helicopters in police work.

The decision by Suffolk Police to obtain a helicopter was made in 1998. The cost of £2,000,000 was covered by a central government grant of one million pounds. A condition of the grant was that the remainder of the cost be made from efficiency savings within Suffolk Police Force. Annual running costs are in the region of £500,000.

The helicopter is based at Watisham and is the only police helicopter in the country to be based within a military site. This is ideal because security is good and Watisham is quite central in Suffolk.

The helicopter is an A99 with twin French turbojets. Both Cambridgeshire and Essex have their own helicopters and the three counties work together so that they can cover for each other when one of the helicopters has to be serviced. G-SUFF, which is, as Adrian said, a "personalised number plate", normally operates at around 1000 feet.

The high-tech equipment includes two cameras, a powerful searchlight, a 700 watt loudspeaker, a video down-link and satellite navigation equipment. One of the cameras is for daylight use and the other is a thermal imaging camera which is able to pinpoint humans on the ground by the body heat they generate. The video

down-link enables operations to be overseen by the control room at Suffolk Police Headquarters. Altogether an extremely sophisticated addition to policing in Suffolk which operates around 700 flying hours per year.

Tasks include emergency response to accidents, etc. searching for offenders and missing persons, evidence gathering, vehicle pursuits, command and control capability and traffic management.

Adrian, who is a flight observer, is ex-RAF. G-SUFF carries a civilian pilot and two police flight observers.

A vote of thanks was given by Stanley Ward and the whole audience very much appreciated the excellent presentation by Adrian Bleese.

Our meeting next month should feature an illustrated talk by Mr Ian White. The title of the talk is "Night Fighters from 1939 to 1955". Our meeting in March should feature an illustrated talk by Mr Roger Freeman who is an extremely knowledgeable author and aviation historian. Non-members are always welcome at a cost of £2 for admission. It will be held in the Community Hall and should start at 7:45 pm.

MARTLESHAM CONSERVATION GROUP

In January our working party brought us into the woodland on the heath. It was a beautiful, bright, cold sunny day with a sharp frost and with the woodland looking lovely showing hues of brown, green and white. We worked just below the village green, clearing some of the gorse, bramble and scrubby trees from a glade in attempt to make it more open. This practice helps to reveal the heather and grasses and encourage them to re-establish. It provides more light to the ground allowing the smaller plants and shrubs to flourish with out being crowded and overshadowed. This activity is vital to the woodland as a whole as it helps to maintain a mixture of habitats, and promotes a higher diversity of wildlife species. We have attempted to manage the woodland on this basis since the inception of the group, mainly conducting working parties in mid-winter to clear out glades and cut the grassy areas in late summer and so keep a more diverse ground flora with its dependent wildlife. We have also transplanted new trees from the glades into other areas to provide additional tree cover and so provide a succession of trees of varied age and structure.

Our next working party will be on Sunday 9th February. Meet at 10 am outside the Douglas Bader or give me a call to find out the exact location. We will be working on the Martlesham Heath site of special scientific interest, following up some of the excellent work done last year. Please come along and give us a hand. Fresh air, exercise, conversation and hopefully wildlife are on offer.

PORTAL AVENUE WOODLANDS MANAGEMENT/ CONSERVATION GROUP

Martlesham Heath

The Group would like to thank all our volunteers for ensuring that last year we accomplished over 800 hours of voluntary work in the woodland. Hopefully this year we can improve on this figure, although it will be difficult. The next working day is Sunday the 16th of February and as always we meet at the Force HQ Sports Field entrance at 10 am for a two hour session. The 16th is the start of Bird Box Week and one task we shall be undertaking will be mounting Group produced boxes throughout the woodland. Also, dependent upon the turnout, we need to carry on with the never-ending tasks of chipping branches, path improvements, revetment repair and TLC for our 140 metre hedge. Projects planned for later in the year are the production and mounting of bat boxes. To this end the Chairman had a bat expert visit the woodland who has given advice on construction, siting, etc. of the boxes and promised to revisit if more advice is required. We will also be constructing wooden pyramids, using varying lengths of trunks of trees sunk into the ground next to each other, to form rotting wood habitats for, in particular, stag beetles which we identified in the woodland last year.

We still have the phantom

tree seedling destroyer who unfortunately has started on the hedge along the A1214, and is also probably the chipping path destroyer. He/she is being very careful as to when he/she acts and any information from woodland users would be gratefully received. How we will explain to young school children that trees they have planted are being wantonly destroyed is beyond me.

The other work days for your diaries are the 15th March, 20th April, 17th May, 15th June and the 19th July. We are always on the look out for more helpers from youngsters up to pensioners like myself, and if you feel like a bit of fresh air and exercise (as much or little as you can manage) then anyone is welcome. HOUSE-TO-HOUSE CASH COLLECTION IN OLD MARTLESHAM AND MARTLESHAM VILLAGE

2003 found the Animal Home in Martlesham very full with so many creatures in need of new and caring homes. This situation will fluctuate during the year. Nevertheless, the supply is always greater than the demand, caused by annual increases in abandonments, cases of ill-treatment and various other incidents that occur when families break up, or the pet no longer fits in with their present circumstances. The lucky animals will find care and comfort at Martlesham Home, if accommodation permits. Some will be "short stay" before being adopted into a new home. Others, perhaps elderly, not so attractive, or in need of special understanding, could remain in the Home for many months. No creature is ever "put to sleep" at Martlesham unless terminally ill or proven of unsound temperament. All, eventually, will find the right home. We must be thankful for this ruling, but both money and space is required to put it into practice.

It is necessary to consider a new and larger cattery, isolation block and proper accommodation for small mammals. Improvements such as these depend on public funding, Charity and fund raising. It is accepted that one of the greatest sources of revenue comes from Door-to-Door Cash Collections, which over the years has sadly seen a decreasing total from Martlesham Village. This is not because of any lack of generosity from the residents, as their willing donations increase annually. The reason is the "Collectors" decreasing from ten to only four. That has resulted in a vast area of Martlesham Village remaining "uncollected" during 2002 and many would-be-generous donations have remained u n t a p p e d .

Old Martlesham has seen an increase from two to four Collectors, but more are needed to cover the area adequately. Collections can be made during light evenings or at weekends throughout the year. A little of your TIME is their greatest gift. I appeal particularly to the good people who have adopted a pet from the Home and others who enjoy unconditional loyalty which an animal gives. Please spare a thought for the needs of creatures who must wait for such a privilege and ring 01394 284605 - volunteer your help.

RECEIVING FREEVIEW DIGITAL TERRESTRIAL TV

on Martlesham Heath

The digital TV signal from the Sudbury transmitter is lower power than the conventional analogue one, so receiving an adequate quality signal represents quite a challenge on the Heath where we are confined to indoor/loft antennas and are out of range by postcode. **CANON BRIAN
LILLISTONE,
RECTOR OF MARTLESHAM WITH
BRIGHTWELL FOR OVER 25
YEARS: AN APPRECIATION**

(by Edwin Still, retired Reader)

After Canon George Taylor retired in 1974, drastic changes took place in the church life of Martlesham. The Rectory and Glebe Cottage were sold, and Martlesham was to join with Brightwell to become a new benefice in a different Deanery (Colney's).

In May 1976 Brian Lillistone, the new Rector, arrived in Martlesham with his young wife and son and daughter to give leadership in this new situation! Dudley Burgess, former Church warden and tenor extraordinary, tells me the parishioners were suddenly confronted with a human dynamo!

It was two years later that the "Martlesham experience" began for my wife and myself, when we also moved into Viking Heights. Yes, for a few months Brian and Audreen lived at the far end of "our" road, and proved kindly and helpful near-neighbours. Then the Rectory was switched over to the Heath, which clearly was to become the main centre of population within the area.

From that time on, Brian worked ably and hard with his Parochial Church Council to set up a centre for worship on the new Heath estate. At first we worshipped in the Pavilion, but by the end of a decade Brian's quiet determination and ability to empathise with people's varied needs had paid off. A congregation coming from widely differing church traditions - and none - had grown steadily, and at last it had its own permanent Church Centre. Now in Martlesham and Brightwell the Benefice was able to offer a very wide range of services, from more formal ones at St. Marys' and Brightwell to less formal ones at the new Centre, St. Michael's.

In keeping with Brian's ability

to empathise with other traditions was his frequently expressed warm appreciation of the witness and work of our neighbours in the Black Tiles Fellowship. More, he set an example to the rest of us not only in that way, but also in the way he saw the role of his congregations as extending to the wider community. As he made clear in his preaching, we were here to serve all those living in our area by being the best neighbours we could. Brian's work over the years with the Parish Magazine, which is not a church production but serves everyone in our area, is an example of his ideal in practice.

Brian Lillistone was a man of many parts. His skill as a chef was considerable. Halfway through a portion of his Mississippi Mud Pie, I could never call to mind whether gluttony was one of the seven deadly sins, and fervently hoped it was not! I am sure he helped build community by his culinary efforts, and certainly gained good causes a lot of money!

Brian was a fine scholar, but he did not flaunt his scholarship. It came out naturally in his well-crafted and thoughtful sermons. Otherwise, if you wanted to know, you had to ask. And then he would quietly give an answer that helped, and sometimes push the right book in your direction as well!

Brian had a staunch and able companion in Audreen. Her gentle manner belied a keen business brain. For a number of years in Martlesham we saw her mainly as a caring mother bringing up her children. But she also held a top-quality secretarial post with an Ipswich firm, and she showed us these other skills when she organized with calm efficiency the financial side of our recent parish trip to Iona.

I must add a lighter note: Audreen also has a sporting side to her. In earlier years we used to go on parish picnics in Walberswick. After the meal we played rounders, and in these games Audreen would astonish both parish and wildlife by

the ease with which she kept clouting the ball vast distances!

To sum up: we shall miss them both sorely, but must be grateful for the foundation which they both, with God's help, have provided for us for future worship and witness in the Benefice. We wish them Godspeed in their future life together!

THE RECTOR WRITES

Bishop Jeremy Walsh writes

It's dark when we go to work. It's dark when we get home. How we long for light during the dark days of winter.

There's darkness in the world, too. Threats of terror, and talk of war. We hope for light at the end of the tunnel.

On February 2nd, we celebrate Candlemas. It's a festival of Light. We remember when Jesus' parents took their baby Child to the Temple in Jerusalem "to present Him to the Lord". There, an old man, Simeon, was looking out for them. He welcomed Jesus as the Saviour. He called Him "the Light of the World".

Candlemas is a celebration of Jesus the Light. Light in all our lives, and Light in the world.
