# MARTLESHAM MOTHERS' UNION

Tony Hale from the Probation Service was the speaker at our March meeting and gave us much food for thought. There is now a New Criminal Management System in force. NOMS (National Offenders Management System) brings Probation and Prison closer together. While public protection must remain para-

mount, it is widely recognised that the heavier prison sentences are not working. Probation orders used to be locally centred but are now controlled from Whitehall, Sentencina is becoming more realistic with weekend or mid-week prison, or community punishment which involves small groups of prisoners working on local projects. These projects must be easy to oversee and must not jeopardise local emplayment. An example of work done is the painting of the railings round Christchurch Park and various cemeteries. Prisoners on probation are of both sexes and come from all age groups and all walks of life, from unemployed to business executives.

On 25th March a group of our members attended the Lady Day service at the Cathedral to support Elizabeth, Monica, Margaret Cotton and Margaret Rollins as they were commissioned in their respective MU posts for the next 3 years.

# PORTAL AVENUE WOODLANDS MANAGEMENT/ CONSERVATION GROUP

Unfortunately we have another three reports of antisocial activity in the woodland. Over the Easter break youngsters have again been vandalising the wartime aircraft revetments that we have been trying to restore and which are the only remaining examples in Suffolk. Horses have been climbing those revetments causing damage, and one household on Deben Avenue has trimmed their conifer hedge and just dumped the cuttings on the path in the woodland along the back of Deben Avenue. Someone suggested that we should shred the cuttings and post them through the offending householder's letter box. Interesting thought but we will not stoop to their level. However, if necessary other action using the legal system will be taken.

On a brighter note, last year we completed a mammal survey in the woodland for the Mammal Trust and they have requested that we do this every year. We would be grateful if users of the woodland note any unusual mammal activity (please not rabbits or squirrels), record it and the time and day and pass it on to a committee member. We are also organising activities with Gorseland School and the local Beavers in the woodland, which will include mini-beast hunts and discussions on conservation and hopefully hands on activities. The thought is that the more youngsters we can involve the better looked after the amenity will become. This month's workday is Saturday 15th May meeting at 10 o'clock at the Force HQ Sports field gate and all are welcome.
