We can then work to plan to fulfill or resolve these as much as we are able and try to further improve the community and its facilities. The

plan will also be very useful in our liaison with and consultations from the district and county councils and other agencies.

Temporary closure of Martlesham Hill/Top Street

By the time you read this work should have started on building the new roundabout at the junction of Ipswich Road and Martlesham Hill (off Top Street). We were given short notice of the actual date and only found out details of arrangements for the buses more recently. There will be no buses going through Top Street and instead all buses to and from Woodbndge will come as far as Crown Point From Black Tiles or Tesco as appropriate and then turn round; there will be temporary bus stops in Ipswich Road near the new roundabout. The County Council expect the works to take about 3 months but if you have any queries their contact is Andrew Pearce on 01473 583244.

For your interest the road that goes uphill from Top Street towards Woodbridge has always been known as Martlesham Hill.

Drunken disorder in The Square and on The Green

Following earlier incidents of the above there has been a meeting with the police, Suffolk Coastal District Council, MCL and Bidwells about the possibility of an alcohol ban on both The Square and The Green. We were advised that there were not sufficient grounds for an "alcohol ban" but a record is now being kept of any such incidents to see if such a ban is needed and can be justified; the police did advise, however, that they had sufficient powers to deal with any problems should they arise.

PORTAL AVENUE WOODLANDS MANAGEMENT/ CONSERVATION GROUP

The Group's summer holiday has now nearly finished and as the wildlife mating period ends, our own frenzy of activity will pick up. The Chipper/Shredder has had its rest and servicing, and will soon come back into operation to limit the build up of arsonist material, and to improve wet weather path surfaces by use of the shredded material..

The feedback from our display at 'Music on the Green' was good and several people indicated that they would like to help. We will keep our fingers crossed as all volunteers are welcome. We also walked a party of 64 schoolchildren through the Wood to the Parish Rooms, where we put on a display and then walked them back to Gorseland School. They seemed to enjoy it and we had a nice letter of thanks. The younger we can interest children in the management/conservation of the woodland the better.

Apart from the normal birds and insects in the Wood we have had two new sightings. The first has been the appearance of several stag beetles, both male and female. This beetle is Britain's largest beetle, the male growing up to 2 inches long with what look like nasty pincers, but actually harmless. We will be constructing insect habitats in the winter with the trunks of thinned trees and will report these sightings to the People's Trust for endangered species who are currently carrying out a survey. The other visitors for the last 3 weeks have been a family of Sparrow Hawks, interesting for us, but not welcomed by the other woodland birds!

The next two working days are the 1 4th of September and the 6th of October. As always we meet at the entrance to the Force HQ Sports field at IOam for a two hour session of work and all are welcome.

The other date for diaries is the 17th of October for the Annual General Meeting at the Parish Rooms at 7pm. We will be formulating the next annual work plan', amending the Management/Conservation Plan and electing Chairman/Secretary and Committee members so we would like to see as many interested people as possible, to enable us to reflect what users of the Amenity want to see.

MARTLESHAM CONSULTANTS LTD "LOOKING AFTER OUR VILLAGE"

It may be depressing to think about it, but we have to start planning for the tree surgery we will carry out in winter. If anyone has any concerns about the safety of MCL trees, or there are trees or branches that are causing problems, please let us know through the contact methods below. We will then draw up a list of work to carry out when the trees are dormant. We will also consider cases where residents believe that there are severe problems of shading. Our policy is to leave trees to grow naturally wherever possible, although in exceptional cases, and with the agreement of our tree surgeon, we will carry out thinning of branches at residents' expense. We cannot allow residents to carry out or commission work on MCL trees.

MCL attended a meeting with the police, and County, District and Parish Council representatives to discuss proposals for banning alcohol from the Village Green. We agreed with the other attendees that it would not be appropriate to apply for this type of order at present, although we will continue to monitor any problems. There is in fact more under-age drinking, with associated problems of intimidation of passers-by and litter, on other areas of the Heath. The Police are aware of this and have plans to reinforce the community policing to manage the situation.

August and true to tradition we had an evening visit in place of our usual monthly meeting! We visited the now defunct American air base at Bentwaters. It has been bought lock, stock and barrel by the neighbouring farmer and businessman, Bill Kemball and he kindly showed us around. We were shown over the control tower and the nuclear bomb storage area and several other areas that we didn't know existed! Bill surprised us when we visited one hangar only to find a comprehensive selection of vintage tractors and commercial vehicles. This is a passion of his and will eventually be open for public display. The old base, which was closed 10 years ago, has inevitably become a business park and the many buildings were gradually being utilized for different purposes. Bill Kemball told us that much of the runway, which was resurfaced just two years before the base closed, will be removed. However, sufficient will remain for light aircraft to be able to use it. Our own member. Norman Rose was with us and he has been associated with Bentwaters since it was built towards the end of WW2 and so, along with Bill Kemball, was able to give an interesting insight into its history.

We had a stand at the Lowestoft Air Show thanks partly due to generous sponsorship by Bennington HR Solutions Ltd and partly to several members who manned the stand during the two day event. We had many interested visitors and promoted our Control Tower Museum. We also sold a large number of raffle tickets in aid of our "Open Day", on Sunday, September 22nd.

MARTLESHAM HEATH

AVIATION SOCIETY GRAND OPEN DAY

We are very pleased to announce that following the very successful Open Day last September, that we will be hosting a similar event this year in the area surrounding the Control Tower. Please make a note in your diaries for SEPTEMBER 22nd and just follow the signs off Parkers Place, which is off Eagle Way.

We are hoping to have a flypast by the "Battle of Britain Memorial Flight". If this does not materialise we have arranged for a display at 11.30am of a WW2 North American Mustang. Mustangs were based here from 1943/45. Our Open Day coincides with a visit by some of the veteran fliers who flew Mustangs from here. We are hosting around 19 American visitors and a similar number of RAF veterans who were based here at different times.

We are expecting the arrival at 2pm of another veteran American aircraft. The Boeing Stearman was the standard basic trainer used by the USAAF and many British airmen were trained in the United States and Canada during WW2 on these aeroplanes. Another arrival at approximately 2pm will be the aerobatic Russian Yak 52. All flying is subject to prevailing weather conditions.

The event starts at 10.30am until around 4pm and many fun attractions will be here. A number of vintage civil and military vehicles and also an ongoing display of model aircraft on the adjacent football pitch. Numerous stands selling everything from bric-a-bac to fine aviation prints. The Museum will, of course, be open.

A "Chuck Wagon" will be present for all your hot-dogs and baconbutties and drinks, both hot and cold!
