Forthcoming Elections

On 1st May there will be elections for both the District and the Parish Councils in which both of these entire councils will be elected. There will be different arrangements regarding the new council wards and full details of these are provided as a loose insert with this month's Martlesham Monthly. If anybody is interested in becoming a parish councillor please contact the Clerk, who can explain what is involved in the first instance, or speak to any parish councillor.

Litter and Dog Fouling

Martlesham is a clean and tidy place and to help keep it that way the Parish Council will soon be installing some new liner and dog dirt bins. Please use these and the many existing bins around the parish to help Martlesham continue to be clean and tidy.

County Councillors

At the moment Martlesham has one County Councillor, John Kelso, shared with Kesgrave. The Boundary Committee for England of the Electoral Commission is now reviewing the County Council's electoral arrangements and is currently seeking views, comments and suggestions, the Parish Council will be considering this at its February meeting and a main concern is that having only one councillor representing both Martlesham and Kesgrave is insufficient and this needs to be improved. Several options are being suggested by the County Council and each option uses the new wards set up for the district council. It appears that Martlesham could have three county councillors, each representing different parts of the parish and shared with other parishes or parts of Kesgrave and Woodbridge. We hope to have more details in time

for the Parish Council meeting on Wednesday 5th March; your views would be most welcome.

Park & Ride

You will all be aware that planning permission was granted by the County Council for its proposed park & ride site in Martlesham in spite of objections from the district and parish councils and from many other individuals and organizations. We are grateful for all the support that there was against this scheme over the years and particularly for those parishioners who worked so hard on the action group and again more recently.

It is planned to update this website and to ensure that it can be kept up to date; we are very pleased that some pupils from Kesgrave High School may be able to help with this. He explained how nurserymen coped with the task of growing the thousands of bedding plants that are purchased each year - from the seed to the ready to sell product, there is quite an amount of automation involved now which is not surprising. Mr. O'Brien-Baker gave us hints on sowing seeds ourselves, which seed would keep another year, and what to look for when buying for our own gardens. He also demonstrated how to plant out a hanging basket using new materials instead of moss and advice on using water and feed pellets. He was thanked for his interesting talk and advice that we gardeners are always ready to absorb.

The first of May will be an important turning point for the future of local councils after a year of so much publicity about possible reorganisation of local government, quality parish status, codes of conduct, etc. It is vital that plenty of people are willing to stand for election as well as turn out and vote. MARTLESHAM HEATH AVIATION SOCIETY

February 7th and a large audience turned up to hear Mr Ian White give an absorbing factual account of the deployment of night fighters from 1939 to 1955, with particular reference to the development of Radar.

Before the lecture began the audience observed a minute silence for two of our members who died recently. Sir Ivor Broom was an Honorary Vice President of the Society and Sid Cooper was a long-standing member who often attended our meetings. Sid will be known by many for his photo-

graphic record of the building of the Orwell bridge.

Night fighters were, of course, first used during the Great War when they hunted the German Zeppelins. By 1936 the British were gradually becoming concerned about the warlike aims of the Third Reich and by 1939 a Blenheim Mk1 had been fitted with the fledgling AI (airborne interception) radar, which had been developed at Bawdsey. Blenheims of 25 squadron operating from Martlesham Heath were employed in this development.

Six fighter or fighter/bomber types were adapted from 1939 to 1955. The Blenheim was the first of these but in truth was outdated by the beginning of WW2. The Bristol Beaufighter became available in late 1940 and was fitted with a Mk4 version of the original AI radar. These early systems operated on a 1.5 metre band.

In 1939 the first successful cavity magnetron was produced at Birmingham University - another brilliant British invention that was immediately handed to the US. We simply did not have the manufacturing capability of America.

Wavelengths could now be measured in centimetres. Suffice to say that this completely revolutionised airborne radar. Development of both radar systems continued together for a while but "centimetric" radar, as it was known, soon became the standard. The cavity magnetron is present in most homes as it is the operating mechanism of microwaves.

The Luftwaffe at the start of WW2 was experiencing negligible loss from night fighters but as radar was advanced with the adoption of AIS and fitted into the superb Mosquito fighter/bomber this made intrusion into our airspace by the enemy virtually impossible. AIS stood for airborne interception and the S stood for centimetric!

Ian White lives locally and recently retired from BT Research after a total of 37 years service. He was originally in the City of London with the GPO and moved to this area when BT, as it is now

called, moved here. A vote of thanks was given by Gordon Kindred. The audience had been treated to another very interesting evening by a most knowledgeable speaker.

Our meeting next month will be held on Friday 7th March and should start at 7:30 pm. Our speaker will be the highly respected author of aviation books, Roger Freeman. His illustrated talk will be called "With Martlesham in Mind". Should be another evening not to be missed and will take place as usual in the Community Hall.

CAPTAIN LEN WILLIAM WRIGHT 1923 - 2003

On Thursday 6th February, Martlesham said farewell to Captain Wright. Some of you will probably not know Len by name but most of us will have at some time or another seen an upright gentleman with a well-trimmed moustache carrying a shopping bag around The Square - this was Captain Wright. Len moved into Martlesham Heath a few years ago, became a director of MCL and took the Village to his heart. Here is his obituary:

After basic training and Officer Cadet Training he was appointed to the Army Air Corps. On completing his qualifying parachute course he joined the Parachute Battalion and served in Italy and the United Kingdom.

In September 1944 his Company fought for 3 days at Arnhem Bridge where he was wounded and taken prisoner after being shelled and burnt out of the buildings they had occupied.

Following his release from POW camp he joined the Gordon Highlanders, qualified as a Glider Pilot and then rejoined the Parachute Regiment. He served with the Gordon Highlanders in Berlin before being posted to the Support Weapons Wing, School of Infantry, as an Instructor. He returned to the Parachute Regiment and left the Army in October 1955.

In civilian life he became involved in the politics of the Poultry Industry, which he represented, as the Chairman of the British Egg Association then as Chairman of the British Poultry Federation. He took

An active interest in the Parachute Regimental Association and the 3rd Parachute Battalion (1941-45) Club. He married in 1946, was widowed in 1981 and leaves a son, daughter-in-law, two grandchildren and a brother.

Captain Len Wright was one of life's real characters.

Captain Len Wright

We were saddened by the death recently of Len Wright, who had been a Director of MCL for a number of years. Despite long-term health problems, Len was a spirited and enthusiastic contributor to the Company, and was always generous with his time. He had retired as a Director before Christmas when failing health made it impossible for him to continue, and we will remember him as a valued colleague and member of the community.

Land Maintenance

This year has seen a large number of improvements to the open spaces that we own and manage. Early this year, we carried out work to open up the woods inside Eagle Way, and this has attracted many favourable comments from residents. Recently we have been working with our contractors to improve maintenance standards in a number of areas, and many of you will have noticed that the gorse that was overhanging Eagle Way near the woods has now been cut back. This has tidied up the appearance of the area as well as making it safer to cross the road there. Our intention is to maintain these regularly from now on.

The winter storms took their toll of trees across the Village, but we have moved quickly to sort out the damage, and have planted a number of replacement trees.

We have recently planted trees on the site of the hangar that was demolished near the Control Tower, and also on the green at Manor Road to add some interest to what was a rather featureless piece of ground.

We have also carried out

our regular round of tree surgery and dealt with a number of trees that were causing problems for residents. This is a difficult area as people have different perceptions of what constitutes a problem. We also have a limited budget and cannot therefore undertake all the work that we would like to do. We do our best however, and hope that members appreciate the work done and the difficulties we face in making decisions on what action to take.

If anyone would like to help our work to look after and improve the Village, either by becoming a Director, by joining the Land Maintenance Committee, or in some other way, please contact the Company office to arrange to talk about the opportunities for getting involved.

Metal Detection on MCL Land

Recently, one or more people have been using metal detectors and digging in the woods at the South end of Eagle Way. Because of the wartime use of the Heath, pipe-bombs were buried in the ground to destroy the runway in case of invasion. The Army carried out a thorough search of the open spaces in 1984 and declared them free from these demolition charges, but it is quite possible that other items of ordnance such as shells and anti-personnel devices may remain buried anywhere in the region.

Because of the dangers involved, MCL is not willing to give permission for metal detection and digging on its land.

KESGRAVE & DISTRICT HELP CENTRE

STOP - CHAIN -- CHECK were the keywords on how to beat Bogus Callers and Distraction Burglars in the talk given by Crime Reduction Officer Inspector Ian Farthing to an audience of about forty at a recent Help Centre coffee morning.

A Bogus Caller is often a man or woman claiming to be an official of a Utility Company urgently needing to check your water, gas or electricity. They may have an accomplice who, while you are kept talking at your front door, will enter through your back door. When they have gone you may

find your money and valuables have gone too.

If you have an unexpected stranger call follow the 'Beat Bogus Burglars' routine:

STOP - Lock your back door and remove the key.

CHAIN - Put the chain or door bar on your front door.

CHECK - their identity, carefully.

Let them in only when you are absolutely sure they are genuine.

WHEN IN DOUBT - KEEP THEM OUT. If you think you have a bogus caller, ring the Police on 999.

Bogus callers may also claim to be tradesmen offering to do unnecessary work. Always get a second or third opinion and price before agreeing to any work.

More detailed information on how to beat the Bogus Caller or Distraction Burglar is available from your local police station, Community Police Officer, Local Councils, Age Concern, Help the Aged and the Home Office booklet 'How to beat the bogus caller'.

Although most callers at your home will be genuine, an awareness that there are villains about will help you to avoid the trauma of a burglary. Remember **STOP—CHAIN—CHECK**.
