#### **Good Neighbour Scheme**

The purpose of this is to establish a network of volunteers in the parish to answer the need for a variety of help such as giving lifts to hospital or doctor appointments, befriending the lonely and bereaved, helping the elderly, sick or have disabilities with shopping, etc., letter writing or help with form filling or minor odd jobs around the house or garden. Any such scheme would be set up with the help of Suffolk ACRE and we would be pleased to hear from anybody who may be interested; please let the clerk know.

Now that the evenings are getting darker would cyclists please make sure that they have lights on so that they can be seen by vehicle drivers and pedestrians.

#### Possible alcohol ban

There are suggestions that this should be considered as a way of helping to combat anti-social behaviour. # PORTAL AVENUE WOODLANDS MANAGEMENT/ CONSERVATION GROUP

When talking to people we often get asked, "Where is the woodland?" The woodland is the area bordered by Deben Avenue, the A1214, Portal Avenue and the Force Headquarters perimeter fence. This was the area first allocated by the County Council as the Park and Ride site. After a battle to save this amenity was successful, with the agreement of the Owners, we set up the Group to manage/ conserve this private woodland. Well in excess of 800 hours voluntary work is done each year. We are a working group of Martlesham Parish Council and, due to a Woodland Tree Preservation Order on the area, we clear all work with the Coastal District. This amenity is used by many people from as far afield as Ipswich, and here comes a plug volunteers of any age are always welcome (I am ancient).

One persistent problem we have is with horse riders, and the number of complaints is increasing. We have improved the path surfaces using chippings and sand and taken out low branches, but unfortunately this seems to have encouraged riders to canter/gallop which destroys volunteers work and

Many people I have had conversations with over the past months have asked, 'How many churches do you look after'? When I answer 'three', and then name them a puzzled expression comes over some faces when I mention St. Mary's church Martlesham. Where is it?

Well, St. Mary's is off School Lane, which in turn is opposite the Red Lion in Martlesham. It is a beautiful church both inside and out. (We are working to open the church on weekdays, as at the moment you will probably find it locked. If you do want a look round please give me a ring 01473 622424 and I will see what I can arrange). There has been a church on the site since at least 1086, and quite likely well before that. The Doomsday Survey of 1086 noted that in 'Merlsham' there was a one church benefice with 36 acres valued at 3 shillings. As the latest minister I note with interest that the earliest recorded Rector was Roger de Milkelegh in 1285.

One of the things that impress me about this church is the fact that it represents hundreds of years of faithful worship of God in Martlesham. It has been a way of life for many in this community to worship God in this church. In fact it is still the way of life for many in this community now to come together in this way. I could talk about the stunning stained glass, the interesting tower, the chancel or the font, but the picture that stays with me concerning St. Mary's church is that of generations of Christians worshipping a God who they have found to be; faithful, loving, compassionate and kind.
