Work is scheduled to begin at the end of August on a new play area for 2-12 year olds on the piece of land known as Kronji's Piece. The funding for this largely comes from Suffolk Coastal District Council's Outdoor Playing Space Funding Scheme. When complete the existing play area will be removed. **Designated Public Drinking Orders** Suffolk Coastal District Council has advised us that these orders should come into effect in August. Look out for signs around the parish, a notice in the East Anglian Daily Times and press releases.

Allotments

The Council has received many written expressions of interest in allotments. A meeting of interested parties is to be arranged and will be advertised. All those who have written in will be contacted individually.

Notice boards

The Council was considering a programme of refurbishment of its 12 notice boards, some of which are in quite a poor state. However the question was raised whether it was worth using taxpayers' money in this way and consequently the Council decided to consult the The Council therefore parish. proposes to remove its notice boards at the top of Deben Avenue, Manor Road, Main Road/Black Tiles Lane junction, Crown Point, School Lane and The Street unless it receives written objections from parishioners by 8th August 2007. Any submissions will be considered at September committee meetings with recommendations to the full Parish Council in October.

Remember to seek advice from Suffolk Coastal District Council on whether you need planning permission. Don't forget that there are restrictive covenants on all properties in Martlesham Heath and on some in Martlesham.

This is an entirely voluntary organisation that attends, as its name suggests, most accidents that occur on our roads in Suffolk and the surrounding area. It has 28 participating doctors, mainly GP's who are specifically trained to respond and give immediate care at the site of the accident. It takes approximately three and a half minutes between a call being taken and a responder being sent on their way. The time factor being of vital importance in saving lives. Parish and town councils do make grants to the service every year but it does rely heavily on voluntary donations to cover insurance, administration costs and expensive equipment to be used at the accident scene.

Our President told members that a rethink was in hand regarding our Denman College bursary. A vote will be taken at our AGM in November regarding any changes that we make.

MARTLESHAM HEATH **AVIATION SOCIETY**

We were privileged to thoroughly entertained at monthly meeting bу Wing Commander Ken Wallis, (Retd). Better known for his appearance in the James Bond film flying his autogiro "Little Nellie".

Wing Commander K H Wallis MBE, DEng (hc), CEng, FRAeS, FSETP, Ph.D (hc), to give him his full title, drove down from his house, Reymerston Hall, near Dereham to deliver to a capacity audience an illustrated account of his life. He is a brilliant engineer and has designed and built several innovative inventions over the years. Ken Wallis was born in 1916 and it was soon apparent that his engineering skills were exceptional. He built a motor cycle at the age of 11!

He joined the RAF and became a

pilot despite a sight deficiency, which he managed to conceal. After flying Lysanders on patrol duties he then piloted Wellington bombers, first over Germany then in Italy. After the war he remained in the RAF and spent a time in Nebraska, Nevada on an exchange visit and flew the mighty Boeing B36 bomber. After returning to England he was involved in research and development. Ken retired from the RAF to Norfolk in 1964 and designed and built autogiros. Apart from his appearance flying his own design of an autogiro in the James Bond film Ken also appeared in an Italian film and flew his extraordinary invention around the statue of Christ on the top of the mountain in Rio! Even landing on a ledge near the summit.

His voice and vigour is extraordinary for a man of 91 years. It is somehow fitting that he doubled for James Bond in the film, "You Only Live Twice". His life has been so full that it almost amounts to two lifetimes!

We were able to collect a handsome sum of money for his charity, The Norfolk and Suffolk Aviation museum at Flixton, of which he is President. After a very late finish Ken Wallis drove the 65 miles back to Dereham!

We look forward to seeing him again when he formally opens our "Open Day" on September 9th. He has promised to bring "Little Nellie", with him. We will also expect a visit by a Dakota from the "Battle of Britain" flight. Alan Powell. 622458.

Safer Neighbourhood Team

Kids - Robbie Williams (& Kylie) -Chrysalis/EMI October 2000 As usual - the clue is in the title

Time has come to reveal to a wider audience in the local community a project that has come about after a considerable amount of work by quite a few people. The Bell Inn project, is as you may suspect centered on The Bell pub in Kesgrave.

It all started last autumn when Pc Lisa Root at the SNT suggested that we try and locate somewhere for

the youngsters aged between 13 and 16 to go to in the evenings - to offer an alternative to the usual places in public spaces. Between us we considered different locations and then I thought back to my own youth and what I used to get up to at that age(but never got caught doing!) and my thought turned to pubs. No more clues as to where I was at that age.

Subsequently I decided to approach the Licensee at The Bell, Debbie

McCallum - and it took no effort at all to get her agreement to shutting down her 'sports' bar at the back of the pub for one evening a fortnight so that the youngsters aged 13 to 16 could go in and enjoy the facilities - without of course, alcohol or tobacco.

That was the easy bit. Next came the realities of risk assessments, CRB checks, planning, training and preparation and of course, funding. The 3PT team fully supported the project financially and put some £1300 into it for a 12 month stint and we had some really good feedback from various quarters that spurred us on - and from what we could tell, this had never been done before - certainly not in this area of Suffolk - and we couldn't find any other locations to learn from so as far as we know, it's a 'first' Licensing issues were considered and negotiated, the 'regulars' were consulted and we did a little market research when we were out and about - all with a good response.

As a result, on alternative Tuesdays, The Bell Inn at Kesgrave opens it Sports Bar to local youngsters aged 13 to 16 from 7pm to 9.30pm and those attending can use the pool / darts / juke box / big screen Tv and other facilities in the knowledge that they are not being 'organised' in the way that they may expect to be in other places. Make no mistake, they are supervised (after all, it's a working pub)and they are subject to the etiquette of pub rules - they can be banned if the Licencee decided to do so - and they are expected to behave responsibly. It's stressed

that it's for local youths. The idea behind this project is that a) it gives youngsters somewhere to go that has an adult theme but where they can relax with people their own age - b) it gives them time to get used to 'pub rules' before they are entitled to visit the 'other' bar when they are 18 - c) it give the Licensee knowledge of who the local youngsters are - and to get to know them - after all, the pub can still be the centre of the local community- d) many ideas are born in a pub - so this could be an opportunity to involve the youth in that process and include them in the extended process - such as the Kesgrave Music Festival which started life in The Bell - and e) in some areas, the pub is about the only bit left of village life - and if we can make a success of this project, perhaps we can be a model for others to follow. Debbie has further secured time on the 'other' Tuesday evening so that she can alternate locations with the youngsters between The Bell and the new sports centre being built being KWMCC - good eh? Nice one Debbie. A huge thank you to all of you who were involved in the planning of this project - you know who you are - though I don't know you all! This year is the 200th anniversary of the passing of the Act which prohibited the Slave Trade in Great Britain and which subsequently led to the total abolition of slavery. At our meeting on July 16th, a large audience was treated to a talk by Clive Paine entitled " Thomas Clarkson -The Friend of Slaves". Although it was Wiliam Wilberforce who rightly reaped the parliamentary credit for the passage of the legislation, it was Thomas Clarkson who created the public support and provided Wilberforce with all his "ammunition" and there was a local interest as Clarkson spent the last thirty years of his life at Playford Hall and is buried in the churchyard there.
