We would like to thank all those householders who came to the two sessions in October to pay their maintenance charge. Directors find these sessions useful for getting feedback from residents, or passing on information. The woodland paths are very muddy at the moment and consequently very slippery in some areas. We would ask residents to be aware of this if they wish to walk through the woods. Also, we would remind people that in heavy rain storms the branches of trees can become very heavy and break unexpectedly, therefore if you chose to walk the woods at these times it is at your own risk.

We have had some contact from residents recently and in the recent past, concerned that dog faeces is becoming more common along paths and verges around the Heath. Whilst we agree that this is anti-social and a health hazard, we would point out that this is an issue for the dog owners or, on paths, for the Council and not something MHHL can deal with.

We are continuing to get contractors out to cut back some of the vegetation overhanging the paths/roads around the village, so if there is an area causing problems near where you live please let us know but be assured that we hope to get round to all affected areas eventually. Along with the parish council we would like to remind residents that they should check the boundaries of their own gardens as walking around the Village it is clear that some paths are being

encroached upon by trees and shrubs overhanging fences and walls of gardens.

We are still looking for new directors to join the Board, so if you are interested in getting involved in the way the Village looks in the future and preserving what we have, then please get in touch with us - you don't have to have done anything like this before and it would be nice to see some ladies on the Board (they are in a minority at the moment).

The next monthly MHHL (MCL) Directors meeting will be held on Monday 15th December. This is an open meeting and all who subscribe to the maintenance charge are welcome to attend.

OPEN LETTER FROM MHHL TO CHAIRMAN OF SUFFOLK POLICE AUTHORITY

Detainee Processing Unit at Martlesham Heath

Martlesham Heath Householders Ltd is a non-profit making company whose primary aim is to maintain the open land on the village, to ensure the environment of the village is retained and to represent the interests of its shareholders.

Our membership has expressed a very high level of concern about the creation of a Detainee Processing Unit at the Police Headquarters at Martlesham Heath.

As you are no doubt aware, Suffolk Coastal District Council sent out 306 letters to residents of Martlesham Heath who live nearest to Police Headquarters. We hope you are aware that all 306 replied and all were against the proposal. This, we understand, is an unprecedented level of response and objection and something which, as an organization who values the support of the local community, we believe you should be very concerned about. We believe that if SCDC had sent out consultation letters to the whole village the response would have been much the same.

The great concern of our membership is the release of detainees into the local area. The facility will have 36 cells for the de-

tention of suspects and will take arrested persons from a large area of Suffolk. The throughput of detainees must be in the region of 40 a day, possibly more with bail returnees. We note that the SCDC planning case officer, Mr Martin Price, mentions that the Police have made it clear in their application that in many instances those that are being interviewed (and subsequently released) will not be guilty of any offence. He failed to mention that a good number of them would be on bail for further enquiries/Crown Prosecution Service decision-making/ID procedures. Many of these detainees will of course be charged either on initial detention or when returning on bail. You must accept that a not inconsiderable group of these individuals will be persons with many previous convictions and little or no regard for other people's property or safety.

Our membership feels that Suffolk Constabulary will have to bear the responsibility for any increase in crime that occurs in the area. The detainees will be released at all times of the day and night, often into an area they do not know. While the bus links to lpswich town centre are quite good during the day they are much less frequent at night, always assuming the released person has the money to get back into Ipswich. There are concerns that these individuals may end up wandering the streets of Martlesham Heath at all times of the day and night. Some of these detainees will be on bail for robbery, sex offences, serious assaults, burglary and theft. A number of them will be found guilty, and be repeat offenders. There is a fear that there will be an increase in crime, especially burglary and taking without consent. The car parks at Police Headquarters could themselves be targets.

We understand that Suffolk Constabulary is going to some considerable expense improving site security at Police Headquarters. This appears to be somewhat at odds with the statement that there is no increased risk to the people who live in the area.

We look to you both for some reassurance that these persons will have a level of aftercare and direction back to their home on release from Police Custody and an assurance that the levels of Police Patrols will be raised in light of the increase of known criminals being in the area.

If, like me, you don't have an access route to the back of the house from the outside, you'll know what a pain it can be to secure the cycles to the front or side of the house, but if, like me, you're a motorcyclist, you'll know about ground and wall anchors. They're not that expensive, don't take much effort to fix to the wall (or ground) and provide a very secure anchor point to lock things to - like bikes. In sheds and garages, they can be used to secure larger items like ride on mowers or other expensive equipment (motorcycles) - or in the garden, a ground anchor hidden by plants can be used to secure the bigger garden ornaments and fixtures, like seats or stoneware.

The reason I make mention of this is because at this time last year, the crime rate within the area of Kesgrave, Martlesham and Rushmere St Andrew was sitting at around about 25% down on the previous year (and that was close to 30% down on the year before that) - and I had no qualms in telling everybody about it. Clearly I was tempting fate. No sooner had I announced those statistics, then we were well and truly hit by a run of thefts from insecure cars, sheds, garages and gardens where all manner of property was stolen. Most of it was in easy reach, in plain view and with almost no hope of recovery. Phones, sat navs, handbags, laptops...you name it and it all went missing.

Please - lock it, protect it, secure it, keep it.
