Celebrating their tenth anniversary in style, Music on the Green (the Martlesham Heath-based village day/musical extravaganza) raised an incredible £6,000 this year for the EACH Treehouse Appeal.

Friday 1st October saw the official presentation ceremony of the donation to the extremely worthy recipients at EACH.

Taking place on Saturday 10th July 2010 our tenth Music on the Green (for this was the year of the 'Three Tenners') was a resounding success. Beautiful weather, fantastic music and an incredible atmosphere meant that from start to finish the green was packed with music-loving families and friends.

MARTLESHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Bloor Homes Planning Application, Martlesham

The Parish Council has submitted a strong objection to this application, identifying 14 areas of objection. The Council has proposed 7 conditions representing the minimum steps required to mitigate the significant impact on the local community, should the District Council be minded to approve the application. Nonetheless it has made it clear that it remains strongly opposed to the development even if the conditions are taken on board. 2011 Census

The following information on the Census has been supplied by Keith Welham, Census 2011 Area Manager for Mid Suffolk, South Norfolk, Suffolk Coastal and Waveney:

"The 2011 Census questionnaire will be coming through your letterbox next spring. On 27 March 2011 all residential households in the United Kingdom will be taking part in a census. Since 1801 (apart from in 1941 during the war) a day has been chosen every ten years for this purpose. The census provides an excellent source of information about the population. This enables central and local government, health authorities and many other organisations to plan housing, education, health and transport services for years to come.

The census statistics feed into resource allocation for local authorities and play a major part in their ability to provide local services, so it is crucial the population estimate is as accurate as possible. When the questionnaire envelope comes through the door you'll easily recognise it by the purple 2011 Census logo. Take care of it. If, like many people, you want to complete the questionnaire online, your individual internet code is on the front of the

questionnaire.

Preparations for the coming winter – snow clearance

The Department for Transport is developing guidance for snow clearing and this will be available on Suffolk County Council's (SCC) website soon, www.suffolk.gov.uk.

In the meantime the County Council has issued some advice on liability:

"Last winter the public were concerned that if they helped to clear snow they may have been liable for third party claims. We can confirm that anyone who clears snow from outside their own or someone else's property would only be liable for an accident if their efforts actually made the pavement less safe than it was with the snow and ice undisturbed and as a result somebody is injured."

CHRIS BLUNDELL'S DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT

Leader or Mayor — What is your view?

The Local Government Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 required all councils to reconsider their leadership arrangements. Suffolk Coastal District Council now needs to choose between two alternative options for how the council will be run in the future. A decision must be made by 31st December 2010.

Option 1 – Leader and Cabinet: Under the new law, the Leader is to be elected by the council for a period of four years rather than annually as at present. Once elected, the leader would be responsible for all executive functions and would decide which of these functions should be delegated to other Cabinet members, local committees or officers. The Leader decides on the size of the Cabinet and would appoint between two and nine members to form a Cabinet. The Leader would also appoint a deputy leader (who would also be a portfolio holder in the Cabinet) and who would also serve a four year term. Other councillors would have the same roles as at present, e.g. servicing the Development Control, Licensing, Standards, and Scrutiny and the Council as a whole would be able to remove the Leader.

Option 2 – Mayor and Cabinet: Under the elected Mayor option, the electors of the District would vote for a Mayor of Suffolk Coastal who would hold office for a period four years. This would run along similar lines as option 1 above other than once elected the Mayor cannot be removed from office by the Council and would serve a full four year term. Fresh elections would take place at the end of their term in office.

The Consultation and What Happens Next. The consultation period will open on Monday 11th October and the deadline for responses is 3rd December. A summary of the public response will be presented to the Council when it considers the matter on 16th December 2010. Other Matters: I understand that BT is now pressing for determination of their planning application for 2000+ homes at Adastral Park. However, an interesting situation has arisen that might have some bearing on this application. An application for a large number of new homes in north Ipswich was recently turned down and was also refused on appeal. JOHN KELSO'S DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT

Firstly apologies for the very brief report this month as I have been away on holiday and I am trying to meet the magazine deadlines.

BLOOR HOMES PLANNING

APPLICATION MILL FARM/PIPES

The very latest information that I have received regarding this application is that it will not be going before Suffolk Coastal Development Plans Committee until December at the earliest.

BT'S PLANNING APPLICATION ON THE LAND ADJACENT TO ADAS-TRAL PARK

In my opinion, due to the delay in what to do about the District Councils Local Development Framework (LDF) with the change in Government policy, this application is unlikely to go before the Council's Development Plans Committee until the new year.

I will of course keep you advised and updated on the progress of both of these applications if I should receive any further updates.

I can now confirm that I have received a response to my e-mails regarding the LDF and the Bloor Homes application sent to Councillor Smith the Cabinet member with responsibility for planning matters. Councillor Smith's response was that the Council's understanding of the situation is constantly evolving and that he now feels it would be best to wait until the Council has some really firm outcomes of their review process to speak of. He goes on to say that the mist is now beginning to clear and he hopes that the Council will be able to publish further information within a few weeks.

NO ADASTRAL NEW TOWN (NANT)

The local group, NANT, is continuing

to grow and gain support in the fight against plans to build 2000 homes, including 6 storey tower blocks, on the BT site at Martlesham. The planned development would stretch to within metres of the Suffolk Coasts and Heaths Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. This area contains the Deben Estuary, which is a Special Protection Area and Ramsar wetland site protected under European law.

The BT New Town is just one of several proposed developments between Martlesham and Woodbridge. NANT fear that if these developments go ahead, Martlesham and Martlesham Heath could lose their village-like character, becoming part of a much larger town or a suburb of Ipswich.

Already there is a planning application for 270 houses opposite the Black Tiles and 118 acres of woodland to the east of the old Felixstowe Road is currently for sale with "possible development angles".

The plans for the BT development include much new infrastructure (road changes, schools, shops, water treatment, etc.) and once these are in place it will make it much more difficult for future development in the area to be resisted.

NANT are asking Suffolk Coastal District Council to respond to the change in national planning policy. NANT wants the council to review its planning strategy and establish the true housing needs of the district before considering any major development such as the BT proposal.

300 supporters of NANT marched through Woodbridge in September to declare their objections and to raise awareness of these plans amongst the public. The march was a well received and the group recruited more than 200 additional supporters. NANT also took its protest to the District Councillors prior to the council meeting and held a demonstration at the council offices.

The campaign is gaining momentum. NANT now has more than 2000 supporters who have taken the opportunity of registering their objections to these proposals.

There is another march

planned for November and the organisers are inviting all those who wish to stop this development to join this peaceful protest.

MARTLESHAM HEATH HOUSEHOLDERS LTD

Could parents check that their children understand about not dropping litter? Much of the litter found around the village tends to be sweet wrappers, crisp packets, soft drinks cans and bottles and contents of school lunch boxes (dog owners will know this one). However, there are also adults dropping cigarette packets, alcohol containers and other items. Incidentally, a black bin bag full of alcohol bottles that was dumped in the woods is still there. I wonder who the 'dumper' thought would dispose of them? Part of our maintenance charge goes on employing a very good chap who picks up litter, especially around the Green, but he does not work a 40 hour week and cannot be expected to clean up the whole village.

The Land Committee now has 2 more volunteers and we are hoping to make a plan of areas of the village that need future work to keep the pathways and roads free of overhanging vegetation (low trees, gorse, brambles, etc.) If you know an area you think may already be a problem, or will become one with winter weather (snow or heavy rain bringing down shrubs) then please let us know and we will include it.

Please also check your own garden boundaries as the paths are becoming difficult to walk on in some places due to overhanging plants/trees. We are getting requests from a few residents to remove perfectly healthy trees that are getting larger or dropping leaves/seeds on their properties. We will not remove healthy trees and feel that the enjoyment of living in a tree-filled environment means that we have to accept that at certain times of the year there will be leaf fall/seeds. Unfortu-

nately we have a predominance of birch trees which this year have produced a bumper crop of seeds. The horse chestnuts have cropped heavily also. There has been an abundance of fungi around the Village — also interesting and a necessary part of the growth cycle of trees.

MARTLESHAM CONSERVATION GROUP

Many thanks to all those who came along to the meeting on 5th August in St Michael's Church Centre to hear about the proposals for the future management of the Western Corridor land under the control of Martlesham Heath Householders Ltd, and what this might mean for you.

The Western Corridor is a mosaic of habitats with a wider range of flora of particular value for butterflies and a large area has been designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). The habitat has slowly declined in heathland character and now needs a substantial amount of work to bring it back into what would be considered a good heathland site. Natural England are being approached through a Higher Level Stewardship application to provide some funds for additional work much above the capacity of our volunteers. A management plan is currently being put together by us and MHHL as part of the application to Natural England. Please contact me if you would like more information about it. More information will be forthcoming in future articles.
