Many thanks to those who took the time to complete the Neighbourhood Plan (NP) survey and who helped in any way with delivery & collection; this will be reported on elsewhere in the newsletter by the NP team. Thanks in anticipation to volunteers at the Recreation Ground Working Party on 25 October 2014 (it hadn't taken place at the time of writing!).

Vacancy for a Parish Councilior - Please join us in doing the best for your parish!

We still have another vacancy and can co-opt a new member at a full Council meeting. Councillors bring a variety of skills and knowledge to looking after the area where you live. Please come along and meet them at any of our meetings, as listed below.

We do have quite a number of noncouncillors actively involved in various working groups however we do need a new council member to be engaged with decision making and inputting on consultations relevant to our parish as well as helping in practical ways.

The Clerk is also happy to provide further information or put you in touch with a councillor to get first-hand knowledge.

Lamb Barn Hill/Main Road Footway

The width of the footway on the west side of Lamb Barn Hill has been narrowed over the years by encroachment from the banking, forcing pedestrians closer to passing traffic often coming at speed down the hill. The Parish Council has been liaising with the Suffolk County Council (SCC) for some time to work out a solution and the Highways Department has agreed to install a slab embankment. This is being funded by County Councillor O'Brien's Local Highway Budget, the Parish Council and the highways maintenance budget. It is anticipated that work will commence within the next six months but this is dependent on SCC Highways Department scheduling.

What have we been doing recently?

- Assisting with the Neighbourhood Plan survey
- Engaging with the District Council as the planning authority and local residents on housing development issues within our parish, particularly in the northern area
- Training our play area inspectors to a higher level through RoSPA (Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents)
- Progressing the Management Plan for the Recreation Ground: Running a working day to make a practical difference to the Recreation Ground and Kronji's Piece; Martlesham Community Council given the go ahead to improve the fencing
- Promoting local democracy and engaging with young people through 'Council in the Classroom' at Gorseland School

River bank grass cutting, Martiesham Creek

The Environment Agency will be doing grass cutting on the flood defences along the River Deben at Martlesham Creek, from the Sluice Wood running north over Martlesham Creek Sluice to the end of the bank at the Sewage Works.

The work is scheduled for October/November 2014.

The Agency will undertake their usual vegetation cutting regime and also cut the vegetation on the front face of the embankments along with an additional 2m strip on the rear of the wall in some locations. They will also be cutting back any scrub vegetation situated on the embankment.

The purpose of the additional cutting is so the embankments can undergo a detailed inspection to check for problems or damage which may affect their performance. The findings of these inspections help the Agency in decisions about maintenance of the walls and if any repairs are needed.

Message from the Suffolk Police & Crime Commissioner, Tim Passmore

Tim Passmore is aware that speeding remains a significant cause of concern for local residents. As a result the speed enforcement procedure has been reviewed. The policy now requires a strict, proportionate and evidence based approach to speed enforcement where Killed or Seriously Injured (KSI) data and public complaints are analysed and assessed by a tasking process in order to identify where police enforcement is needed. He advises local residents to report, in the first instance, speeding concerns via their local Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) (telephone 101). His office (telephone no. 01473 613614) can also be contacted to forward issues to the Constabulary. SNTs are also the point of contact for enquiries about Community Speed Watch.

MARTLESHAM NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN - UPDATE

Neighbourhood Plan Survey - As you are aware the Neighbourhood Plan Survey has been taking place over the past weeks. We now have all responses returned 47% online and 53% manually. The response has been truly outstanding with a total feedback of 920 surveys, 37%. This is an excellent return for a survey of this nature. Thank you all for participating and a special thank you for the people who helped with the distribution, collection and transferring of the surveys online, you made it happen. The next stage is to look at the data received and from your input identify the issues and wishes you want to see in the plan. This part of the process will take some time while we work on the information but given the approaching Winter holidays we will endeavour to share the results with you in a Public meeting in January. Watch this space for future dates.

Other news – Our discussions with Suffolk Coastal District Council on the potential Adastral development are making good progress. We have had constructive meetings with the District Planners and are very close to agreeing how we shall work together to plan the development if it is to go ahead. At this time the overall scheme remains on hold pending a court ruling planned for 21 January.

We are in the process of resubmitting our Neighbourhood Plan Boundary to match that of the Parish. This has been a longstanding debate but with confirmation from Suffolk Coastal we are confident this will be agreed in the coming weeks.

On a sad note I want to express our deepest sympathy to the family of John Foster. Sadly John passed away in early October. John was a friend, keen supporter and volunteer of the Neighbourhood Plan and he will be sorely missed by us all.

Suffolk Coastal Business & Community Awards. The search is again on for Suffolk Coastal's unsung heroes as the 2015 Suffolk Coastal Business and Community awards open for nominations. 'Look before you Book' your Christmas and New Year meals. Suffolk Coastal DC, Waveney DC in conjunction with the Food Standards Agency want to remind people planning that special Christmas meal with work colleagues, friends or family to 'look before you book'. These illustrious official bodies recommend that you check the Food Hygiene Rating of the establishment before you book your meal. The ratings are determined by local authority Food Safety Officers and run from 0 to 5, with a 5 rating meaning a very good level of food hygiene. 93% of local food businesses are rated 3 or better so there are plenty of places with good standards. If however you don't see a green and black sticker in the window or you spot a low rating on line, you can make an alternative choice.

Thank you to all Householders who have paid their maintenance charges so far this year. The use of online banking seems to be getting popular and we have had two good sessions at the Pavilion.

Recently we have cut back the gorse between Parkers Place and Demesne Gardens along with the area between the Oaks and Birch Grove. We will continue along Eagle Way paths adjacent to MHHL property until cleared.

The installation of the remaining Bollards protecting both Greens will shortly be completed. We have reviewed our plans and worked with Graingers achieving more strategic locations of bollards with reduced visual impact and cost. Learning from experience the fold down versions near the Bader are being replaced by telescopic bollards that retract totally under ground.

Very sadly I have to report that we are still suffering from Vandalism particularly the night of the 10th/11th October. It is clear that some of the culprits live on Martlesham Heath. MHHL would encourage anyone with any information surrounding the recent trends of vandalism to contact the local constabulary on 101 or 999 if you see any vandalism taking place.

Of the USAAF personnel 72 (seventy two) gave their lives – died – so that you were able to throw that stone. It only broke a pane of glass, we'll replace it of course, or maybe if you read this and have even a little bit of those men's bravery and courage you can come and help replace it, or even pay for the damage!

I rather suspect not.

Muzzling Dogs

The second incident occurred today, as my son was cycling across the Heath to school. A Dalmatian dog ran up to him and bit his leg he jumped off his cycle to protect himself before the owner called the dog back. I don't think the owner realised this had happened though. The injury to my son did not require treatment, however it did pierce and bruise his skin. Please, please, if you know your dog has aggression issues, when out walking in public spaces make sure it is wearing a muzzle before someone gets seriously hurt.

MARTLESHAM HEATH AVIATION SOCIETY

Our meeting on Friday 3rd October was an illustrated talk "Flying Aces", by Peter Hart, who is an oral historian at the Imperial War Museum, London.

A large audience was given a most entertaining account of flying aces in the Great War. He vividly described the conditions and the life that was normal both in the RFC and the German Air Force. Peter mentioned several aces including the legendary "Red Baron", Manfred Von Richthoven and Billy Bishop, Ernst Udet, Edward Mannock and the controversial James Mc Cudden.

How, by 1918 the sheer volume of aircraft on the allied side overwhelmed a German air force that was short both of aircraft and fuel.

Peter Hart is indeed a very animated speaker and a vote of thanks was given by one of the founder members of our society, Roger Harrison.

In our adopted role of guardian of the aviation history and heritage of Martlesham Heath we have recently spent in excess of £1600 to maintain the three memorials on the Barrack Square and we have now received a grant for £400 towards this from Suffolk County Council. Our grateful thanks to Councillor Patricia O'Brien for facilitating this.

Did you know what was made in Ipswich, then come along and find out more? MARTLESHAM CONSERVATION GROUP

Many thanks to all those who came along and helped at our last work party on Sunday 12th October clearing gorse and tree scrub towards the middle of the heath next to the path. We intend to continue working in this same area for our work party in November. Please note our work party in November will not be on the usual 2nd Sunday but will be on the 3rd Sunday,16th November at 10am. All are welcome all tools and equipment are provided.

In early July we undertook a survey of the Silver Studded Blue butterflies on the heath SSSI. The numbers counted were disappointingly lower than the previous year, but at least the butterflies were present in a number of different areas. In general the other butterfly species seem to have been doing reasonably well. To hear more about our local wildlife please join us for our AGM which will take place on Monday 17th November at 7-45pm in the Parish room, next to the Community Hall on Old Felixstowe Pood

Autumn is a good season for mushrooms, and we should expect to find them in the cooler damper period before the cold and frosty nights take hold. This year a lot of mushrooms, including the evocatively named Parasols were present much earlier in the year, even in August. The appearance of these fruiting bodies was presumably triggered by the cooler spell at that time accompanied by wetter weather, which must have seemed like a premature autumn. September was comparatively warm and dry and as consequence several butterfly species were prevalent through to the end of the month and into early October. Looking ahead to colder weather we should look out for an influx of migrant birds such as Redwings, and Fieldfares. Who knows we may also get some of the rather colourful Waxwings feeding up on berries.

Hospitality

Hospitality isn't exclusively Christian but it does have a high profile in the Bible and in the history of the church. The word comes from the latin hospes – from which we get the words hospice and hospital - and many modern hospitals, especially well known teaching hospitals, and most hospices trace their roots back to Christian initiatives.

In Old Testament times hospitality was seen as a duty with the host being responsible for the guests safety as well as their welfare. Guests had to be offered bread and water at the very least although usually something more substantial was offered such as meat and milk. In the New Testament Jesus depended on people's hospitality during his ministry as did Paul in the early church.

Around AD400 Chrysostom built seven different units of hospitality in Constantinople ranging from hostels for fit travellers to shelters for sick, orphans and the elderly. In the Middle Ages religious orders developed ministries of hospitality. Benedictines were particularly prominent with one of their rules being, "Let all visitors who chance to arrive be welcomed as if it were Christ himself." Many hospitals and hospices have Christian roots from this time as they cared for the sick and dying. Barts, founded in 1123, has murals by Hogarth of the Pool of Bethesda and the parable of the Good Samaritan on the staircase. More recently St Christopher's Hospice was founded in 1967 by Dame Cicely Saunders.

So what relevance does this have for us in Martlesham today? Well we too are called to be hospitable in our homes, families and yes in our churches. St Mary's in Old Martlesham recently undertook some modest changes enabling refreshments to be served after services and a bigger project is in hand for St Michael's on Martlesham Heath. We are planning to turn part of the church building into a not-for-profit coffee shop for the community. We want it to be a comfortable place for a quiet cuppa and read of the papers or a venue to meet friends, a place known for great coffee and delicious scones but above all a place of welcome for friends and strangers alike. Watch this space for updates!
